Orlando Park Improvements Proceed

Elite Court Construction of Oviedo patched and resurfaced the basketball courts in Orlando Park which is funded through the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program (FRDAP) grant previously approved by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP).

The fifty thousand dollar grant will also include repairs to the existing swing sets, construction of a picnic shelter of approximately twenty-four feet by thirty-six feet, the purchase of five picnic tables, and installation of one or two play items that will add to the existing play items in the park. Existing play items include a climbing wall, horizontal ladder, chin-up bars, track slide, swing sets, and those items purchased last year through a FRDAP grant—Dayton Express, tilted skyrunner, Wavebreak, eight foot slide, and two see saws. The selection of play items is made by the Town's Parks, Recreation, and Beautification Committee.

IRRIGATION RULES REMINDER

The St. Johns River Water Management District's watering regulations are as follows:

Daylight Savings Time: residential landscape irrigation is allowed on Wednesday and Saturday for odd numbered addresses, Thursday and Sunday for even numbered addresses and Tuesday and Friday for non-residential irrigation.

Eastern Standard Time: residential irrigation is limited to Saturday for odd numbered addresses, Sunday for even numbered addresses and Tuesday for non-residential irrigation.

In addition, no landscape irrigation is allowed between 10 am and 4 pm.

POLICE BEAT

Recent events have generated questions about making 911 calls from cell phones. When a 911 call is made from a traditional landline phone, the call is directly routed to the appropriate emergency agency with the owner's information and address registered with the phone company. When a 911 call is made from a cell phone the location is not always routed to the appropriate emergency response agency. This happens because location data is dependant upon which cell tower receives the call and other factors such as whether the call was being made from within a structure. For example, if a 911 cell call is made in Indialantic the call could be answered by a 911 operator in Palm Bay, the County or other emergency call center. The location of the call will be unknown unless the caller can articulate their location precisely. This becomes problematic if the caller cannot speak, is not familiar with the area, and given that many cities/towns have similar and/or identical street names. Determining the caller's location then transferring the call to the appropriate dispatch center can result in a significant delay in the response time of emergency personnel.

This is a national issue of which the FCC is aware. The FCC has given the phone companies until the year 2017 to meet a 40% compliance rate and until 2021 to meet an 80% compliance rate of accurate call delivery location for cellular 911 calls.

This information should be an important consideration if you are thinking of eliminating your landline phone and going all cellular, especially if you have young children or others in your home who may have difficulty articulating an accurate location. When using a cell phone for emergency purposes you should be conscious of your location and communicate it clearly to the 911 operator when asked. Whenever possible, try to make a 911 cell call from outside of a vehicle or structure as this can increase location accuracy.

INDIALANTIC FIRE RESCUE



Greetings to all Indialantic Businesses and Residents.

Your firefighters have been busy conducting annual fire and safety inspections on the commercial and multi-family properties in Indialantic. You will once again be seeing them conducting annual fire hydrant inspections, which requires us to fully open each fire hydrant and flow water from them. We do this in coordination with the City of Melbourne Water Department. If you experience cloudy water we ask that you attempt to flow water from a sink or outside spigot for a few minutes in an effort to clear the disturbed silt. If the water does not clear up call 321-608-5133 or 321-608-5130 Mon.-Fri. 7:30 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. or 321-255-4622 all other times and report the water condition to the Melbourne Water Department. Melbourne will send a crew out to flush the water lines in your area in order to clear the cloudy water.

For many households the clothes dryer is an indispensable necessity. However, damaging fires can occur if clothes dryers are not properly installed and maintained. According to the U.S. Fire Administration, between 2008–2010 fire departments responded to an average of 2,900 clothes dryer fires in residential buildings. These fires caused an estimated 5 deaths, 100 injuries, and \$35 million in property loss.

A clothes dryer works by forcing hot air through a turning drum. Wet clothes placed in the drum are then dried by moving hot air. It is possible for a full load of wet clothes to contain as much as one and a half gallons of water. Lint, consisting mostly of small fibers from the clothes and debris in or on the clothes, is created from the clothes as the clothes tumble in the drum. While much of the lint is trapped by the dryer's filter, lint is also carried through the vent system along with moist air. Accumulated lint leads to reduced airflow and can pose a potential fire hazard.

In addition to the accumulation of lint, blockage in dryer exhaust vents also can occur from the nests of small birds or other animals or from damages to the venting system itself. A compromised vent will not exhaust properly to the outside. As a result, overheating may occur and a fire may ensue.



It is recommended that an adequate supply of canned foods and fresh water (enough for at least three days) are kept on hand. Residents that will require a shelter which is equipped for those with special needs, specific health and medical conditions must register with Brevard County Emergency Management. - Blue** - marine pest warning; pests include sea lice, jellyfish or sharks
